Featured Steward

This past March, **Amietee Fuondjing** of the **Anacostia Watershed Stewards Academy** completed his capstone project in the main courtyard at Burtonsville Elementary School (BES). In September of 2023, Amietee organized a walkthrough of the planting location and henceforth submitted his capstone proposal. In October, he presented his planting design plans to BES, which was finalized in November. To determine the types of trees to plant, Amietee conducted a poll with the school. Students were presented with different choices of native species



and once the votes were in, a budget was finalized in December. Just a few days before the planting event, Amietee gave a presentation to five fifth grade classes at Burtonsville Elementary School as a primer for the tree planting happening later that week. In his presentation, he talked about what a watershed is, the Anacostia watershed, and watershed topics such as the impact of runoff.

On Thursday, March 21st, Amietee, together with the 5th grade class (115 students) and with friends from the Anacostia Watershed Society planted a total of 9 trees (5 Fringe trees, 2 Witch Hazel, 1 American Hornbeam, and 1 American Persimmon). The planting lasted the entire school day, from 9 am to 4 pm. Each class participated in a 20 minute workshop led by Jamie Craven, an Environmental Educator with the Anacostia Watershed Society, which highlighted the effects of runoff on pervious vs. impervious surfaces. Following the workshop, the tree planting portion was led by Matthew Reise, a Green Infrastructure Specialist for the Anacostia Watershed Society, and Amietee. Throughout the day, each class took turns digging and planting trees, getting them to all 9 trees in the ground by day's end. Amietee reflects on having the pleasure of watching the 5th graders in the beginning of the week go from having no clue about the Anacostia watershed to becoming novice experts, all while showing genuine excitement. Looking ahead, Amietee is optimistic about MoCo's increasing presence in watershed related outreach.

He encourages schools like BES, who aims to be a Maryland Certified Green School, to implement more community-oriented and out-of-the-box activities such as this one. (Bonus: Now BES makes an activity out of allowing students to water the trees weekly!)

How a Return to Tribal Management is Restoring Landscapes
