Maryland Native Plant Society: Native Orchid Walk at SERC

On Saturday, May 10th, we were able to walk in the old growth forests of SERC, the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center, in Edgewater and check out some native orchid hot spots. Dennis Whigham, our tour guide and scientist emeritus, has many years of research experience related to forests, fields, and wetlands around the world. His explorations have lead to studies of woodland herbs including orchids, vines, wetland species, and invasive species, and studies fo forests in the tropics, temperate, and boreal zones. His current passion is to establish the North American Orchid Conservation Center (NAOCC), an initiative of the Smithsonian and the United States Botanic garden. We were joined by Judy Fulton, the vice president of the Maryland Native Plant Society, and members of the MNPS. 
