## **MG Monthly Meeting - Native Plants Identification Workshop**

Lisa Kuder has nearly a decade of experience working with various stakeholders, including the Maryland Department of Transportation, on creating pollinator habitats. Her passion for native landscapes extends to the commercial industry where she's done extensive marketing and production development on sustainable lawn alternatives using indigenous grasses and wildflowers. As UMD's new Native Plants & Landscapes Extension Specialist, she's excited to work with both industry and the general public on increasing the availability and use of native plants. She holds masters degrees in entomology and environmental biology. A fun fact about Lisa is that before joining UME, she was a HS chemistry teacher.

Maryland has an amazingly diverse flora with over 2,900 established taxa, of which 72% are native and 28% are introduced. To learn every species would be an incredible feat, likely

of the world's 8prominent plant families. In this workshop, we'll consider basic botanicalterminology, plant ID resources, and the distinctive characteristics of the 8plant families. Then, we'll get some practice using these ID tips and apps on the plants at the Anne Arundel Extension Office. If it's raining, we'll go to Plan B, and ID photos of mystery plants. We hope that you'll join us for this interactive workshop. IDing plants using the pattern method is fun, and will give you a new way to discover the world of plants.

- Potatoes were harvested by the children from the "potato bucket"; families continued to take lettuces and kale for their dinertables; herbs in the Mediterranean garden are flourishing; strawberries werefew, but tasty; and the native flowers are thriving both inside and outside of the fence.
- One family grew turnips from seed, and enjoyed abountiful harvest.
- A strawberry festival was hosted for thefamilies and the volunteers with shortcakes, delicious strawberries, and LOTSof whipped cream.
- A succulent garden is happening in a birdbathoutside our Garden gate; our families and Park visitors enjoy the "fairies" andother objets d'art that mysteriously find their way into the birdbath garden.
- A Garden family made an insect house, and it nowhas a place of honor on an inside garden post.
- A former Apprentice Garden young gardener haschosen the Garden for his Eagle Scout project, and he has the wonderful idea tobuild houses for overwintering insects with different types of winter "houses" that we can install in our Garden. Weare very excited about his project.

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## Severna Park Plant Clinic Garden

**The Severna Park Plant Clinic Garden** has been acommunity effort from the onset. We have been gifted many times over. Thes egifts have kept the momentum of the garden in high spirits.

Our most recent donation happens to be 2 Rain Barrels which will be used to store water for use in the Garden. The Plant Clinic on average has 70 folks stop by the booth and ask questions and we have the garden to alsohelp answer questions about native plants and sustainable practices for homegardeners.

Currently we have 2 Dogwood Trees, donated by WSA. Our network of Master Ggardenersdonated a total of 120 native perennials and 2 shrubs. We purchased through the UMD Master Gardener budget 5 shrubs and 20 perennials. A plant grant from Bona Terra was received and 300 seedlings are being nurtured for giving to the community through the Plant Clinics. A portion of the plants will be used in the Plant Clinic Garden and shared with other gardeners. The vendors at the market have been very receptive to having a garden to beautify their market space. Thanks everyone for coming together as a community to make this happen! The Severna Park Farmer's Market Plant Clinic has been sharing instructions on building "Mosquito Buckets of Doom." Folks have been picking up instruction packets from the table. We modified the bucket a bit to include a mesh cover
